I hope your semester is going well and that you are managing the unpredictable Kansas weather! It is important to **dress warmly** and be cautious of the weather. We never know when the weather will turn bad, so please be careful especially when walking, driving and traveling!

Thank you and Congratulations to all the students who participated in any way with the Chinese New Year, Celebration of Diversity. The program and celebration of the Year of the Snake was a GREAT SUCCESS!!! There was great attendance and we heard many positive comments. Thank you for your hard work!!

Midsemester is fast approaching, so be sure to visit with your academic advisor and prepare your worksheet in Tiger Tracks in order to pick your classes for the fall 2013 semester. **Remember**, if you plan to take a Virtual College course, you should make sure that you are enrolled in at least nine hours of on-campus classes for undergraduate, and 6 hours of on-campus classes for graduate students. **SEVIS regulations only count 3 hours of Virtual College coursework toward a student's full-time enrollment.** If you have any questions regarding this, please stop by the ISS Office. You should be sure to review your mid-term grades so you have an idea how you are doing academically in your classes. Mid term grades can be checked on Tiger Tracks around March 12th. If you have questions regarding how to do this, please let us know.

A number of you will be graduating and may wish to have your family attend graduation in May. If you would like an invitation letter from the ISS Office we would be happy to provide that. Please stop by the office and complete a request form. If you have questions about this, please let me know. Also, plan ahead and do not wait until the last minute to request this letter. It will take several days to process your invitation letter(s) and you will be contacted when it is ready.

AS A REMINDER, officers from Homeland Security can visit campus at any time. They will make personal contact with students to verify that current address and personal information is accurate with the SEVIS record. These visits are always unannounced. Always let ISS Office know of any address changes that need to be made.

Finally, as I always mention, **DO NOT LET WORK** interfere with your studies! International students are only allowed to work 20 hours a week while school is in session. I will once again be monitoring this and if you are found to be working more than 20 hours a week, this benefit may be suspended (taken away). I would also remind you that **working off campus is strictly prohibited** unless you have permission. If you are reported or caught working off campus, the employer risks receiving a large fine, and you risk losing your students status and could be deported and permanently barred from the U.S. *Do not put yourself in this position.* Remember, you are here on a Student Visa and not a Work Visa. If you have any question, please contact the ISS Office.

Tax Information: W-2 & 1042-S Forms

1. You may be receiving a W2 form from your employer, a 1042-S if you received a scholarship, and/or a statement of your interest income from your bank. Not everyone will have all of these forms. **Please keep them and do not throw them away.**
2. If you worked in 2012 and did not receive a W2 form or you received a scholarship in 2012 but did not receive a 1042-S, you will need to check with Marnie in the International Office in Sheridan Hall 208 to see if she has a form for you.
3. If you worked for Chartwells (Compass Group is the official name) in 2012 and did not receive a W2, please visit with the Chartwells Office in McMinderes Hall and ask that they get you a replacement. The International Office does not receive W2's for students who worked for Chartwells.
4. If you would like help completing your income tax return, you must attend one of the workshops. We will not be able to help students individually in the office.
5. Tax return workshops will be held on the following dates:
 - March 26 from 1:30-3:00pm
 - March 29 from 1:30-3:00pm
 - April 4 from 1:30-3:00pm



The purpose of this workshop is to help students with completing an income tax return.

Address Updates and Student Status

All International Students should inform the International Student Office (Sheridan Hall Room 208) of any address or phone number changes. It is very important that we have your current information at all times.

The U.S. I.C.E. (U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement), requires us to maintain student records in SEVIS (Student Exchange Visitor Information System). This program requires all schools that issue I-20's and DS-2019's, to report all international students enrolled at their school, the number of credit hours, current address, phone number and if the student is in status with immigration. For this reason **it is very important for you to remain in status and always have your current address and phone number on file with the International Student Services Office.** If you have had an address change, please let our office know as soon as possible.

Also, please be advised that while you may be allowed to enroll in "less than fulltime" schedule with approval of the International Office in your last semester, this is an exception that is strictly monitored and reviewed by Immigration. You are not allowed to have numerous "less than fulltime" semesters; this is typically a one time semester allowance to be used truly during your last semester. Be sure when you request a "less than fulltime" enrollment exception, that it is truly your last semester and you can provide verification of this from your academic advisor.

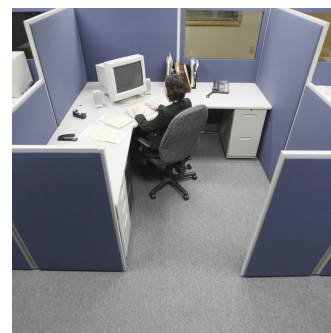

I'm Graduating....What Now?

Immigration Information & Optional Practical Training (OPT)

Are you graduating this May 2013 or summer 2013? We will be holding a workshop for all students graduating in May or this summer. The workshop will be held on Thursday, March 28, 2013 from 3:00-4:30pm in the Stouffer Lounge, Memorial Union. There will be discussion on what the requirements for OPT are, explaining the paperwork that must be completed, and answering your OPT questions. Information will also be given on preparing to leave the US for those not applying for OPT. It is very important for you to attend if you plan on applying for OPT this semester. Practical training applications can take 60–90 days to be completed and returned from the processing center. **Remember, you cannot start a job until you receive this work authorization AND you must apply BEFORE you graduate.**



St. Patrick's Day—March 17—Customs & Traditions

The person who was to become St. Patrick, the patron Saint of Ireland, was born in Wales about 385 AD. His given name was Maewyn and he almost did not get the job of Bishop of Ireland because he lacked the required scholarship. Far from being a saint, until he was 16, he considered himself a pagan. At that age, he was sold into slavery by a group of Irish marauders that raided his village. During his calling he was to convert the pagans to Christianity.

His wishes were to return to Ireland to convert the native pagans to Christianity. But his superiors instead appointed St. Palladius. But two years later, Palladius transferred to Scotland. Patrick, having adopted that Christian name earlier, was then appointed as second bishop to Ireland. Patrick was quite successful at winning converts and this fact upset the Celtic Druids. Patrick was arrested several times, but escaped each time. He traveled throughout Ireland, establishing monasteries across the country. He also set up schools and churches which would aid him in his conversion of the Irish country to Christianity.

His mission in Ireland lasted for thirty years. After that time, Patrick retired to the county of Down. He died on March 17 in 461 AD. That day has been commemorated as St. Patrick's Day ever since. Much Irish folklore surrounds St. Patrick's Day. Not much of it is actually substantiated. Some of this lore includes the belief that Patrick raised people from the dead. He also is said to have given a sermon from a hilltop that drove all the snakes from Ireland. Of course, no snakes were native to Ireland, and some people think this is a metaphor for the conversion of the pagans. Though originally a Catholic holy day, St. Patrick's Day has evolved into more of a secular holiday.

One traditional icon of the day is the shamrock. This stems from a more bona fide Irish tale and tells how Patrick used the three-leafed shamrock to explain the Trinity. He used it in his sermons to represent how the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit could all exist as separate elements of the same entity. His followers adopted the custom of wearing a shamrock on his feast day.

mation if you do not understand it. These are all great resources and are here to help you be successful. It is always best to plan ahead and make an appointment.

On-Campus Employment

This is once again a reminder that while school is in session, international students are only allowed to work **20 hours a week total**. If students work for Chartwells and also have another on-campus job, the total number of hours worked between both jobs **cannot** exceed 20 hours a week. We will be monitoring the number of hours students are working, and if students are working more than 20 hours a week, they will receive a letter from the ISS Office. If a student continues to exceed the 20 hours a week, they could be in jeopardy of losing their on-campus job. **Please remember** you are here on a student visa and not a work visa, so do not let work interfere with your academic coursework.

Have You Checked Your Passport?

If your passport is expiring, you must get a new one, even if you will not be traveling outside the United States! Come in and see Carol, Karen or Marnie if you need information on how to get a new passport. Remember, you must always have a current passport and I-20 to remain in status with immigration.



Spring Break—Please Read!

For those of you who travel out of Hays for the Break, as well as for those who stay here, we have some important safety suggestions and some tips on what you can do. These tips are based on the fliers from the Kelly Center and personal experience. Please, read them!

Some of important tips and rules:

1. When you drive, **DRIVE SAFELY!** Respect the speed limit (if you don't, you will be caught and you may pay hundreds of dollars for it!).
2. **FASTEN YOUR SEATBELT! SEATBELTS SAVE LIVES!**
3. When you fly, **LISTEN TO THE SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS**, read them, and locate the emergency exits around you. **KNOWING THE SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS AND LOCATING EMERGENCY EXITS SAVE LIVES.**
4. When you are in a club, **BE SAFE!** Stay out of trouble. You may be surprised how many people can have a gun in a club, for example, in Denver. If you don't feel comfortable somewhere, leave. But **NEVER LEAVE ALONE**, or leave your friend alone! And remember, if you're not 21, you cannot drink alcohol in bars & clubs. Do you think it is a stupid rule? Well, we all have an opinion, but it is law, and the law should be respected. If we don't respect it, we can get into big trouble (a big fine, jail, deportation...).
5. **BE SMART AND BE YOURSELF!** We are sure your parents have taught you many smart things, and maybe it is not such a bad idea to follow their advice. It is important not to give up on values. It's not cool to smoke marijuana or to get drunk to the point you can't walk.
