Student Intern Spotlights

Tiffani Clark will finish her Bachelor's degree in Organizational Leadership in December 2016. A few months ago, she completed her internship with Make-A-Wish Foundation at their national office in Phoenix, Arizona. While there, she worked with the Grants and Scholarship Program which provides additional funding to the 62 chapters across the country. Tiffani used information from her Grant Proposal Writing Certificate to create a best practices document for grant proposals that could potentially go to all 62 chapters. Tiffani said her education allowed her to complete the project on her own and gave her skills to network and communicate effectively with people in the organization. She has also used skills she learned to be an effective follower in her position with Make-A-Wish.

Harry Truman and the Second World War was taught in fall 2015 by Dr. Curt Brungardt, Department of Leadership Studies and Dr. Kim Perez, Department of History. The course had 14 students enrolled majoring in Organizational Leadership, History, and Political Science. In this course, students learned about the decision-making process President Truman used at the end of World War II when dropping the atomic bombs on Japan.
