From the Chair -- Dr. John Greathouse ----

One question commonly asked by potential students during departmental visits is "What can I do with a degree in agriculture?" It is a valid question that, when properly addressed, will provide some direction and assurance that options for a stable future await in a very diversified discipline focused on feeding and clothing a growing world population.

The latest USDA report of Employment Opportunities for College Graduates in Food. Renewable Energy, and the Environment projects an estimated 54,400 job openings will be available to individuals with a baccalaureate or higher degree in each of the years from 2010-2015. The majority of these positions will be in the business and science occupations followed by those in production agriculture and forestry. The remainder of positions will be in the education. communication. and government services areas.

Universities across the country that offer degrees in agriculture, life sciences, forestry, natural resources, and veterinary medicine are expected to provide approximately 29,300 qualified graduates annually to fill 55% of these positions. It is antici-

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pated that individuals needed to fill the remaining 45% of these positions will come from disciplines in the biological sciences, engineering, health sciences, business, and communications fields.

Key social factors that will dictate actual job markets within this five year time-frame include: 1) macroeconomic conditions and retirements, 2) consumer preferences for nutritious and safe foods, 3) food, energy, and environment public policy choices, and 4) global market shifts in population, income, food, and energy.

Ag Outlook Conference -- Mr. Mick Glaze --

The 33rd Annual Agricultural Outlook Conference, sponsored by the Agriculture Department, was held on October 29, 2010, in the FHSU Memorial Union. Dr Jeff Briggs, Dean of the College of Health and Life Sciences, gave the opening welcome to nearly 100 guests.

Andv Gottschalk. of R.J O'Brien and Associates and HedgersEdge.com, LLC, Greenwood Village, CO, presented his grain and livestock outlook as well as opening remarks on the economy. He started by saying that growth in the economy will be slow at around two percent. Most of the Fed money is still in banks as lending remains tight. Andy noted that India's growth rate could soon overtake China's.

On the cattle side Gottschalk noted that long term world demand for meat protein should continue to grow driven by rising incomes, especially in China and Europe. There is no herd expansion in U.S., Mexico and Canada. The supply side of the cattle market projects to be bullish for the next two to three years.

Dr. William Wilson, from North Dakota State University, also on the

Annual placement data collected by the university's Career Services office confirms this observation. We anticipate this is a trend that will continue as we remain diligent with efforts to provide a high-quality, practical educational experience for those students who choose become a part of our program.

conference schedule, noted some interesting facts about our grain and food supply. Right now China is using all the soybeans they can buy. They could greatly expand their production if they would adopt U.S. technology. Russia is expanding their grain storage as well as their infrastructure. Overall we need to continue to increase grain production if we are going to keep up with the growing demand.

Sarah Hubbart, of Animal Agriculture Alliance, warned producers about some of the efforts from animal welfare activists. Groups such as HSUS, PETA, API, and CWF are trying real hard to put food livestock producers out of business. Producers need to implement animal care programs that will meet public scrutiny. They need to actively share their story. Know who the opposition is and respond appropriately. Make sure your voice is heard in the legislature. Finally, livestock producers need to join the Alliance or other producer group to promote and protect their industry.

It was a great conference. I hope you can join us next year.

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Cattlemen's Beef Board Appointment -- Dr. Brittany Howell ------



Faculty member Dr. Brittany Howell was recently named one of the new 40 appointments selected by Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack to

serve on the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board, or better known as the Cattlemen's Beef Board (CBB). Each CBB member is appointed from nominations submitted by certified nominating organizations which represent beef and dairy producers in each state or region. In Kansas, this is the Kansas Livestock Association, Kansas Dairy Council, Kansas Farm Bureau and Kansas Cattlemen's Association.

The CBB was established by Congress to carry out the Beef Promotion and Research Act program contained in the 1985 Farm Bill, with USDA overseeing the CBB and implementation of the Beef Act. Primary responsibilities of the CBB is to oversee collection of \$1-per-head on all cattle sold in the U.S. and \$1per-head equivalent on imported cattle, beef and beef products as well as approving the annual budget for its national checkoff-funded programs. Members serve without pay, but may be reimbursed for actual expenses associated with CBB business. Dr. Howell will serve with 105 other members from across the United States for a three-year term. She also currently serves on the Kansas Beef Council. Further information concerning the Beef Board can be found on the website www.beefboard.org.

Ag Graduate Selected for Southern Great Plains Dairy Consortium ——

Erica Wasson, who graduated in May 2010 in Agriculture with the Animal Science option, was selected to participate last May, 2010 in a relatively new program (began summer 2008) hosted by Texas A&M University and Clovis Community College called the Southern Great Plains Dairy Consortium. This year's class was made up of 36 students who have a passion for the dairy industry from 12 universities across the United States. Erica worked at the FHSU Dairy for three years during school which fostered her love for the dairy industry. She grew up with beef cattle and horses and is from Baldwin, KS.

The SGPDCT was created to specifically address the need to improve the availability of dairy science education at universities in the Southwest and to ensure the

growing dairy industry a well qualified pool of prospective employees for future employment. The students are selected based on specific criteria, including their interest in a career in large-herd dairy management. Erica greatly enjoyed attending the program and highly recommends it to any future students. When asked for comments on favorite aspects of the program, Erica responded "one of my favorites was the week spent with the vets. We were able to job shadow them traveling to the surrounding dairies and participate in their daily routine. The vets do a lot of preg checking and several displaced abomasum surgeries. They also shared with us presentations for client's employees on topics such as calving, milking, etc. These presentations included a calving school, milking school, etc. I

also enjoyed the week where we were taught heifer management. We visited several dairies to physically see how they were managed and to compare and contrast them to other dairies to view what worked and what didn't."



This is the second year for the Fort Hays State University Swine Show Team, and it has proven to be both an eventful and exciting year. The team started off the 2010-2011 year by traveling to the National Barrow Show in Austin, MN. We exhibited 3 York gilts, 1 York boar, 2 Landrace gilts, and 1 Landrace boar. We were very competitive in all of the classes shown and won the Reserve Grand Champion Landrace Boar. This was a huge achievement and really made us proud to be a part of the Show Team. At the sale we sold 6 of the 7 we exhibited with prices ranging from \$200 to \$1000 each.

After the National Barrow Show, the team readied for the Fall Classic. For this group of pigs the team chose to do a feeding trial by evaluating fat supplement top dresses on the feed. AGRI 316 – Agriculture Management Practicum is a course in which students participate in a supervised agricultural "internship" experience. A majority of our students enroll in the Practicum course during the summer semester with positions that typically offer full-time employment opportunities. Other students obtain part- or full-time employment positions during the fall or spring academic terms and complete the Practicum during the traditional school year. The experiences typically are mutually beneficial to the cooperating employer, who may be seeking an individual to train for future employment needs, and to the students who gain valuable experience working in a chosen career field.


