

ARTIST'S STATEMENT

The emotional weight of our experiences, trauma, and vulnerable moments often leaves us feeling physically and mentally encumbered. Yet it is not these burdens that define us, but how we carry them. The figures in my work often embody this vulnerability, revealing truths that might otherwise remain hidden.

From a young age, men in our society are often taught to suppress emotions rather than process them. This cultural conditioning informs my use of idiomatic titles. Idioms, while familiar, tend to generalize or diminish deep emotional realities. By illustrating these phrases, I aim to critique their oversimplification and expose the complex emotions they conceal.

Recurring motifs such as birds and eggs symbolize the burdens we carry. They are fragile yet precious, light yet significant. Like the thin shell of an egg, life itself is delicate and transient. When broken, the yolk represents an expression of intense emotion, such as anger, jealousy, or a moment slipping through your fingers.

The act of expressing emotional weight, through conversation or creative practice, can feel like releasing a bird from its cage. The type of bird, the colors of its plumage, and its physical state all carry symbolic meaning. In cultures around the world, certain birds are seen as symbols of peace. Others, as harbingers of grief.

Working within Contemporary Realism, and inspired by artists such as Andrew Wyeth, Bo Bartlett, and Alyssa Monks, I depict subjects with detailed realism infused with symbolic, dreamlike imagery. Lighting, color, and brushwork are key to shaping the emotional tone of each piece. While painting remains central to my practice, some ideas that require physical context inspire an expansion into a third dimension. Sculpture allows me to extend these concepts into space, where material choices add further layers of meaning and presence.

The result of my studies is a body of work that emphasizes the subliminal male desire for connection with their emotions and the expression of things we, as men, are often too afraid to accept. Acknowledging the weight of our encumbrances and recognizing the validity of our emotions are vital to the human experience. Through my work, I aim to shoulder these long-carried burdens to the surface.










"Break a Few Eggs"
















"Stages of Grief: Depression"




