## 4. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Survey of Art History: Prehistory to the Fourteenth Century is a general overview of art history from the prehistoric period through the Middle Ages. The course is designed to provide the student with an understanding of the history of art, its multicultural influences, and the aesthetic achievements of humans. An understanding of these examples of creativity will, in turn, enhance the student's awareness and appreciation of art of the past and present.

# **5. COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- Demonstrate knowledge of representative works of Western art and architecture from the prehistoric period to the Middle Ages.
- Analyze works of art and architecture using formal and contextual analysis.
- Effectively utilize art historical vocabulary and terminology.
- Apply the knowledge gained in this course to evaluate and interpret works of art and architecture.

## 6. TEACHING, LEARNING METHODS, & COURSE STRUCTURE

This is mostly a lecture course covering the first several centuries of Art History. Taking notes during the lectures, asking thoughtful questions, and answering questions are some of the ways to engage with the course materials. There will be some exams, an essay, and participation activities during class which will review the previous classes materials.
