Catalogue Description:

Introduction to fundamentals of oil painting, exploring techniques, art history, and theory with a focus on representational painting.

Course Description

This course is designed to introduce students to the fundamentals of oil painting. Students will explore different techniques in oil painting and delve into relevant art history and theory.

Representational painting will serve as a focus for students to develop their own painting

Representational painting will serve as a focus for students to develop their own painting language. Through assignments and exercises, students will explore different ways to visually communicate personal narratives. In addition to in-class projects, reading, writing assignment and artist presentation will be given to expand students' research of their personal interests and identity, as well as build resources of inspiration and conceptual development for the future.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Develop observational skills in oil painting.
- 2. Expand knowledge of oil painting techniques.
- 3. Research and use visual sources to construct narratives.
- 4. Render personal narratives through painting.
- 5. Study related art historical periods and contemporary artists.
- 6. Understand contemporary painting concepts and processes.

Course Outcomes:

- Traditional oil paint techniques and materials
- History and chemistry of oil painting
- Color theory and mixing
- Representational painting skills (Grisaille, Imprimatura, Velatura, Alla Prima, direct painting, glazing, scumbling)
- Composition and design principles
- Idea development
- Art historical and contemporary issues
- Communication skills (discussion, critique, writing)

Course Structure:

- Group critiques will take place on the project due dates.
- The routine of the class: Lecture, demo and studio time completing class assignments or projects. Assignments and projects will have various deadlines

Course Requirements:

- Gesso papers for the semester should be ready by second week of the class.
