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#### **Executive Summary**

The Docking Institute of Public Affairs at Fort Hays State University conducted the 2019 Kansas Speaks fall survey from August 26 to October 14, 2019. A random sample of 352 adult residents of Kansas age 18 and older were surveyed by telephone to assess their attitudes and opinions regarding various issues of interest to Kansas citizens. The survey finds:

- 53.7% of respondents indicated Kansas was a "very good" or "excellent" place to live. 1.5% said Kansas was a "poor" or "very poor" place to live.
- 71% of respondents would be living in the same community they are now. 15.2% would relocate out of Kansas in five years.
- 24.3% of respondents felt the state economy was "very good" or "excellent." 11.8% felt the economy was "poor" or "very poor."
- 31.1% of respondents felt that the Kansas economy was getting better in the last 12 months, 48.9% felt that it stayed the same, and 20% felt it was getting worse.
- 10.9% of respondents were "very concerned" about the future economy threatening their families' welfare. 16.9% were "moderately concerned." 38.2% were "not concerned at all."
- 77.4% of respondents felt Kansas was on the "right track." 22.6% felt Kansas was on the "wrong track."
- When asked to compare what they paid in sales tax, property tax, and state income tax with the amount they paid two years ago, 70.7% of respondents felt that their tax burden had increased as compared with two years ago, 22.1% felt no change, and 7.2% felt their tax burden had decreased.
- 19.7% of respondents preferred higher taxes and spending, while 55.5% preferred lower state taxes and spending. 24.7% wanted to keep the current level of taxes and spending.
- Among those in favor of increases in taxes and spending, 71.2% favored increasing income tax, 59.1% favored increasing sales tax, and 30.3% favored increasing property tax. 98.5% supported increasing state funding for grades kindergarten through high school, and more than eighty percent of respondents supported increasing funding for roads and highways, state colleges and universities, and social services.
- Among those who preferred lower taxes and spending, 48.6% favored lowering sales tax, and 60% or more favored lowering income taxes and property tax. 43.2% favored cutting state funding for state colleges and universities. Less than 30% of respondents supported cutting funding for roads and highways, social services, and grades kindergarten through high school.
- 79.3% of respondents "strongly support" or "somewhat support" increasing taxes on cigarettes and cigars.
- 68% of respondents "strongly support" or "somewhat support" increasing taxes on alcohol.

- 61.3% of respondents "strongly support" or "somewhat support" legalizing recreational marijuana for individuals 21 and older to allow taxation by the State of Kansas. 25.8% of respondents "somewhat oppose" or "strongly oppose."
- 52.7% of respondents were satisfied with the performance of Governor Laura Kelly, and 26.4% were dissatisfied.
- 49.1% of respondents were satisfied with the performance of the Kansas Supreme Court, and 22.6% were dissatisfied.
- 44.1% of respondents were satisfied with President Trump, and 44.3% were dissatisfied.
- 17.4% of respondents were satisfied with the U.S. Congress, and 64.6% were dissatisfied.
- 76.9% of respondents voted in the 2018 Kansas election, and among them, 58.7% voted for Laura Kelly and 31.1% voted for Kris Kobach.
- When asked to rate the five leading Democratic candidates in the U.S. presidential race, respondents' ratings of Bernie Sanders were polarized, with 30.9% of respondents rating him positively and 50% rating him negatively. Joe Biden and Elizabeth Warren received about 25% positive ratings and about 42% negative ratings. More than 35% of respondents were not aware of Kamala Harris or did not know her good enough to rate. 45.6% of respondents were not aware of Pete Buttigieg or did not know him good enough to rate.
- 55.8% of respondents supported the immigration zero tolerance policy, which states that anyone who crosses the border illegally will be prosecuted and deported. 33.4% of respondents opposed it.
- 48.7% of respondents supported Trump's Administration's decision to raise tariffs on goods imported from China, and 35.3% opposed the decision.
- 44.2% of respondents were "very" or "moderately concerned" that the tariff increases on Chinese goods and trade disputes with other countries would affect them and their families financially. 24.1% were "slightly concerned", and 31.7% were "not concerned at all".
- In terms of amount of thought given to the issue, 33.7% of respondents thought "a great deal" or "a lot" of Medicaid expansion as a current political issue with the Kansas legislature.
- 66.3% of respondents agreed that expanding Medicaid would help rural Kansas hospital remain in business.
- 60.5% of respondents agreed that the Kansans who might obtain health insurance from expanding Medicaid deserve this benefit from the state.
- 62.1% of respondents supported expanding Medicaid in Kansas.
- 42.4% of respondents opposed Kansas using private prisons to house inmates. 33.1% supported it.
- 88.1% of respondents supported "requiring background checks on all gun sales."

- 85.5% of respondents supported "preventing sales of all firearms to people who have been reported as dangerous to law enforcement by mental health provider."
- About 70% of respondents supported "preventing sales of all firearms to people who have been convicted of violent misdemeanors", a "mandatory three day waiting period after a gun is purchased before it can be taken home", and "requiring a person to be 21 or older in order to purchase a gun."
- Between 50% and 60% of respondents supported "banning high-capacity ammunition magazines" and "banning assault-style weapons."

#### **Introduction and Methods**

To assess attitudes and opinions of Kansans, the Docking Institute has surveyed a random sample of Kansas residents age 18 and older every year since 2009. For this year's survey, the Docking Institute purchased from Scientific Telephone Samples a random sample consisting of Kansas landline telephone numbers and cell phone numbers. Interviewers are highly-trained student researchers pursuing degrees at Fort Hays State University. From August 26th to October 14th, a total of 2,188 Kansas residents were successfully contacted by telephone, and 352 of them completed the survey, resulting in a 16.1% response rate. The margin of error was 5.2% at the 95% confidence level. A margin of error of 5.2% means that there is a 95% probability that findings among the sample vary no more than +/- 5.2% from the value that would be found if all adult Kansas residents were surveyed, assuming no response bias.

Some urban counties are underrepresented in the final sample. For instance, based on the 2018 estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, Johnson County accounted for 20.5% of the state population, whereas in the sample, only 11.3% of the surveys were completed by Johnson County residents. The county population distribution can be found in Appendix A. The survey also had higher response rates from Kansas residents who are 65 years and older, and lower response rates from those under 35 years old (see Appendix B). To adjust the potential biases, the statistical analyses were conducted after the survey data was weighted by county population and age. The weighted demographic characteristics are presented in Appendix C.

The following analysis contains four sections:

- 1) **Overall Quality of Life in Kansas.** This section shows how Kansans generally feel about Kansas as a place to live.
- 2) **Taxes & Economy.** This section shows results on questions addressing various economic concerns to citizens and fair and effective personal and business taxation policies.
- 3) **Government and Politicians.** This section presents the results of citizens' ratings of the state government in general, state elected officials, and the U.S president.
- 4) **Public Policy Issues.** This section looks at citizens' opinions on a few national and state policies.

These sections present descriptive analyses of respondents' answers to each question. Except for the questions asking about respondents' demographic information, all of the survey questions are displayed verbatim under those graphs presenting descriptive analyses. Survey questions can also be found in the questionnaire presented in Appendix D.

#### Section 1: Overall Quality of Life in Kansas




Figure 1: Rating of Kansas as a Place to Live




Figure 2: Residence in 5 Years (n=335)

When asked to rate Kansas as a place to live, a little over half (53.7%) indicated Kansas was a "very good" or "excellent" place to live, while only 1.5% said Kansas was a "poor" or "very poor place to live (Figure 1). When asked where they will be in 5 years, 71% of respondents said they would be living in the same community that they live in now, 13.5% said they would be moving to another location in Kansas and 15.2% said they would relocate to a state other than Kansas (Figure 2).

Question: In general, how would you rate Kansas as a place to live?

#### Section 2: Taxes and the Economy




Figure 3: Rating of Kansas Economy




Figure 4: Opinion on Change of Kansas Economy

When asked to rate the Kansas economy, 24.3% of respondents said they felt the State economy was "very good" or "excellent," while 11.8% indicated they felt the economy was "poor" or "very poor" (Figure 3). A little over thirty percent (31.1%) of respondents felt that the Kansas economy was getting better over the past year, 48.9% felt that it stayed the same, and 20% felt that it was getting worse (Figure 4). Less than thirty percent (27.8%) of respondents were "very concerned" or "moderately concerned" that the Kansas economy would seriously threaten individual or family welfare, while 34% were "slightly concerned." Almost forty percent (38.2%) of respondents said they were "not concerned at all" (Figure 5).

Question: In general, how would you rate the Kansas economy?




Figure 6: Opinion on if Kansas is on the Right or Wrong Track

More than three-fourths (77.4%) of respondents indicated they felt Kansas was on the "right track." Slightly more than twenty percent (22.6%) of respondents believe Kansas is on the "wrong track" (Figure 6).




Figure 7: Change of Taxes Paid to the State

Respondents were asked if there had been changes in amount of taxes paid to the state. About seventy percent (70.7%) responded that the sales tax, property tax, and state income tax they paid had "Increased" as compared to two years ago, 22.1% said the amount "remained the same," and 7.2% said the amount "decreased" (Figure 7).

Question: Think about what you paid in sales tax, property tax, and state income tax together.

Compared to two years ago, has the amount you pay in state taxes increased, remained the same, or decreased?




Figure 8: Belief about Kansas Government Taxes and Spending

When respondents were asked their preferences about state taxes and spending, 19.7% wanted to have higher taxes and spending, while 55.5% preferred lower taxes and spending. About twenty five percent (24.7%) would like to keep the current level of taxes and spending (Figure 8).





Figure 9: Taxes You Would Favor Increasing (of those favoring higher taxes and spending; n=66)

Among those respondents who preferred higher taxes and spending, 71.2% favored increasing income tax, 59.1% favored increasing sales tax, and 30.3% favored increasing property tax (Figure 9). In terms of their preferences for increased spending, almost all (98.5%)

of those respondents wanted to increase state education funding for grades kindergarten through high school. More than eighty percent of respondents supported increasing funding for roads and highways, state colleges and universities, and social services (Figure 10).

Among those who preferred lower taxes and spending, 69.7% favored decreasing property tax, 59.5% favored decreasing income tax, and 48.6% favored decreasing sales tax (Figure 11). In terms of preferences for decreased spending, 43.2% wanted to cut state education funding for state colleges and universities, 24.3% supported decreased state funding for roads and highways, and 15.1% supported cutting state funding for grades kindergarten through high school (Figure 12).



Figure 10: Funding You Would Favor Increasing (of those favoring higher taxes and spending; n=66)








Figure 13: Taxes on Cigarettes and Cigars, Alcohol, and Marijuana

When given a few different alternative options that Kansas could use to increase revenue, respondents were asked about increasing taxes on cigarettes and cigars, alcohol, and legalizing recreational marijuana to allow state taxation. Almost eighty percent (79.3%) of respondents at least "somewhat support" increasing taxes on cigarettes and cigars. About two-thirds (68%) supported increasing taxes on alcohol. More than sixty percent (63.1%) supported legalizing recreational marijuana for individuals 21 and older to allow state taxation, and 25.8% opposed legalizing recreational marijuana (Figure 13).

Please tell me if you "Strongly Support", "Somewhat Support", "Neutral", "Somewhat Oppose", or "Strongly Oppose" the following alternative revenue sources: Increasing taxes on cigarettes and cigars, increasing taxes on alcohol, legalizing recreational marijuana for individuals 21 and older to allow taxation by the State of Kansas.

#### **Section 3: Government and Politicians**




Figure 14: Satisfaction with the Overall Performance of Elected Officials

Respondents were asked about their satisfaction with important political figures or institutions. Satisfaction is highest with respect to Governor Laura Kelly, as 52.7% of respondents are satisfied with Governor Kelly. The Kansas Supreme Court received the second highest level of satisfaction, with 49.1% of respondents being satisfied with the Court. The U.S. Congress received the high level of dissatisfaction from respondents, with 17.4% being satisfied and 64.6% being dissatisfied. The satisfaction with President Trump was polarized, with 44.1% of respondents being satisfied and 44.3% being dissatisfied (Figure 14).




Figure 16: Voting Decision in the 2018 Governor Election (n=191)

More than three-fourths of respondents said they voted in the 2018 Kansas election (Figure 15). Among those who voted, 58.7% indicated they voted for Laura Kelly and 31.1% voted for Kris Kobach (Figure 16).

Question: Did you vote in the 2018 Kansas election for governor?




Figure 17: Rating of Democratic Candidates in the U.S. Presidential Race (n=340)

Respondents were asked to use a 10-point scale to rate the five leading Democratic candidates in the U.S. presidential race. Bernie Sanders received the highest positive rating and also the highest negative rating, with 30.9% of respondents rating him positively and 50% rating him negatively. The ratings of Joe Biden and Elizabeth Warren were very close, with both receiving about 25% positive ratings and about 42% of negative ratings. However, Joe Biden received higher level of name recognition than Elizabeth Warren: 20.9% of respondents indicated that they were not aware of Warren or did not know her enough to rate, whereas 16.4% of respondents indicated so for Joe Biden. A large percentage (45.6%) of respondents did not know Pete Buttigieg at all or well enough to rate him (Figure 17).

#### **Section 4: Public Policy Issues**




Figure 18: Opinion on Zero Tolerance Policy

When asked about the immigration zero tolerance policy, 55.8% of respondents supported prosecuting and deporting anyone who crosses the border illegally, 33.4% opposed it, and 10.8% were neutral (Figure 18).





Figure 19: Opinion on Tariffs on Goods from China

When asked about the Trump Administration's decision to raise tariffs on goods imported from China, 48.7% of respondents showed some levels of support, and 35.3% strongly or somewhat opposed the decision (Figure 19). More than forty percent (44.2%) of respondents were very or moderately concerned that the tariff increases on Chinese goods and trade disputes with other countries would affect them and their family financially, 24.1% were slightly concerned, and 31.7% were not concerned at all (Figure 20).




Figure 21: Thinking about Medicaid Expansion in Kansas

When asked how much they think about it, 33.7% of respondents think "a great deal" or "a lot" about Medicaid expansion as a current political issue with the Kansas legislature. About forty percent (40.3%) of respondents thought "a little" or "not at all" of this issue (Figure 21).




Figure 22: Opinions on Medicaid Expansion in Kansas

Turning to opinions on expansion, about two-thirds (66.3%) of respondents strongly or somewhat agreed that expanding Medicaid would help rural Kansas hospital remain in business, and 60.5% strongly or somewhat agreed that the Kansans who might obtain health insurance from expanding Medicaid deserve this benefit from the state. More than sixty percent (62.1%) of respondents supported expanding Medicaid in Kansas (Figure 22).

Question: If Kansas expands Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act, about 10% of the expansion would be paid by Kansas, and 90% by the federal government. Studies estimate that expanding Medicaid would provide health coverage to approximately 150,000 Kansans and financially benefit rural hospitals. Please tell me if you strongly agree, somewhat agree, are neutral, somewhat disagree or strongly disagree with the following statements.

About one-third (33.1%) of respondents strongly or somewhat supported Kansas using private prisons to house inmates. More than forty percent (42.4%) opposed it (Figure 23).

Question: As you may have heard, Kansas is contracting with private prisons to house inmates due to the overcrowding problem in state-run prisons. Would you say that you strongly support, somewhat support, are neutral, somewhat oppose, or strongly oppose Kansas using private prisons to house inmates?




Figure 24: Opinion on Policies Surrounding Gun Ownership

Respondents were asked about their opinions on a list of policies surrounding gun ownership. "Requiring background checks on all gun sales" received the highest level of support, with 88.1% of respondents strongly or somewhat supporting it. "Preventing sales of all firearms to people who have been reported as dangerous to law enforcement by a mental health provider" also received more than eighty percent support (85.5%). "Banning assault-style weapons" received the lowest level of support, with 51.8% of respondent expressing support and 41.8% expressing opposition (Figure 24).
