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Ellsworth County Medical Center Improvement Survey

Executive Summary

The Docking Institute of Public Affairs at Fort Hays State University conducted a telephone survey of 464 residents in Ellsworth County, Kansas from September 25 to September 30, 2008. The survey was designed to investigate general public opinions on two initiatives considered by the Ellsworth County Medical Center (ECMC): 1) the construction of a medical training facility and 2) the conversion of all patient rooms to private rooms.

The Docking Institute's analysis finds:

- About three fourths (75.7%) of all the respondents strongly agree or agree that the ECMC should add an education and training center
 for its medical staff. About fifteen percent (15.3%) of them disagree or strongly disagree. Among those who neither strongly agree nor
 agree, 32.15% strongly agree or agree that the ECMC should have such center if the center could also be used for patients and members
 of the community for health education.
- More than sixty percent (62.7%) of all the respondents strongly agree or agree that the ECMC should consider making all of the hospital rooms private. Less than thirty percent (28.2%) disagree or strongly disagree.
- Almost thirty percent (29.2%) of all the respondents think that only sales tax should be used to finance the proposed improvements.
 About three percent (2.6%) of the respondents think the improvements should be financed by property tax only. About twenty-seven percent (27.2%) think the improvements should be financed by a combination of sales and property taxes. About a third (33.7%) of the respondents are strongly opposed to the use of either tax.
- The improvement plan has been publicized in Ellsworth County. Among those who had heard about the proposed improvements before the survey, 63.3% of the respondents think the improvements can be financed by either sales tax or property tax or a combination of both taxes. Among those who had not heard about the improvements before, 56.4% support use of sales tax or property tax or a combination of both.
- About sixty percent (59.2%) of registered voters think the improvements can be financed by either sales tax or property tax or a combination of both taxes. Sixty percent of non-registered voters think the same.

- Costs to patients and the community and benefits to the community are two big concerns of people who need more information to decide whether to support or oppose the proposed improvements.
- Eighty respondents provided suggestions for the ECMC to improve its services. More than twenty percent (22.5%) of them think the hospital needs more doctors.

Research Objectives

The Docking Institute of Public Affairs at Fort Hays State University conducted a random digit dialed telephone survey for the Ellsworth County Medical Center (ECMC). The survey was designed to measure general public support for two initiatives under consideration by ECMC, 1) the construction of a medical training facility and 2) the conversion of all patient rooms to private rooms. It was agreed between ECMC and the Docking Institute that the survey research's objective was to provide initial public opinion only. As with public issues, once an education campaign/lobbying/debate occurs, public opinion can change dramatically.

Method

From September 25 to September 30, 2008, a random digit dialed telephone survey was conducted on a randomly selected sample of households in Ellsworth County. Within randomly selected households, adults (at least 18 years or older) with the most recent birthday were selected to maximize random selection of respondents within each household. A total of 662 randomly selected adults were contacted with 464 interviews completed, resulting in a cooperation rate of 70%. At a 95% confidence level, the margin of error for the full sample of 464 is 4.55%, assuming no response bias. A margin of error of 4.55% means that there is a 95% probability that findings among the sample vary no more than +/- 4.55% from the value that would be found if the full population of interest could be studied, assuming no response bias. In the field of telephone survey research, a cooperation rate of 70% and a margin of error of 4.55% at a 95% confidence interval are considered acceptable to generalize to the larger population.

Appendix 1 reports distributions on demographic characteristics of the sample and, where possible, Ellsworth County population parameters for the same demographic characteristics. The sample has higher percentages of female and elderly people (50 years and older in age) than the overall population. For other social indicators, especially those indicators representing household characteristics, differences between the sample statistic and the population parameter are within or very close to the overall sample margin of error.

As the older age groups were over-surveyed, weights were developed as shown in Appendix 2. These weights were applied to the data, and analysis results were compared with the results obtained from unweighted data. The comparison shows no significant difference, so this report only presents the results obtained from unweighted data.

Findings from Survey

The survey starts by asking whether the respondent agrees or disagrees that the ECMC should add an education and training center for its medical staff. The training center would help the medical staff be up-to-date in their medical training, and also provide equipment to link the ECMC to universities and hospitals. Respondents are given the following choices for their answer: 1) strongly agree, 2) agree, 3) disagree, 4) strongly disagree, 5) need more information, and 6) don't care either way. Any respondent whose answer is neither "strongly agree" nor "agree" is asked if they would answer the first question differently if the proposed training center could also be used by patients for health education, and by members of the community who want to take college courses. The third question in the survey asks if the respondent agrees or disagrees that the ECMC should convert all of the double rooms to single rooms and add an additional 11 private rooms.




Figure 1: Training Center Construction and Room Conversion

Figure 1 shows respondents' answers to these three questions. A little more than three fourths (75.7%) of all the respondents strongly agree or agree that the ECMC should add an education and training center for its medical staff. The remaining one fourth of respondents (113 out of 464) answered otherwise. About fifteen percent (15.3%) of them disagree or strongly disagree, 4.1% need more information to make decision, 2.4% do not care either way, and 2.6% do not know. Those people who neither agree nor strongly agree were asked if they would strongly agree, agree, disagree, or strongly disagree that the ECMC should have the proposed center if the center could also be used for patient health education and by members of the community. One hundred twelve respondents provided valid answers to this question. Out of those 112 respondents, 32.1% strongly agree or agree that the ECMC should add the proposed education and training center. More than half (52.7%) of them disagree or strongly disagree that the center is needed.

Figure 1 also shows that 62.7% of 464 respondents strongly agree or agree that the ECMC should consider making improvements so that all of the hospital rooms are private. Less than thirty percent (28.2%) disagree or strongly disagree that the ECMC should make all of the rooms private.

Nineteen respondents indicated that they needed more information in answering the first question, nine respondents needed more information in answering the second question, and eighteen needed more information in answering the third question. These forty-six respondents were asked what information would be important for them so that they could make an informed decision. Eighteen valid answers were obtained, which are listed in Appendix 3. Most people are concerned about the cost of the improvements and the benefits the community can receive.




Figure 2: Finance of the Proposed Improvements (N=463)

The fifth question in the survey asks if respondents think that some of the money to finance the improvement should come from sales tax only, property tax only, a combination of sales tax and property tax, or if they are strongly opposed to the use of either tax. Figure 2 shows that 29.2% of all the respondents think that only sales tax should be used, and 2.6% of the respondents think the improvements should be financed by property tax only. About twenty-seven percent (27.2%) think the improvements should be financed by a combination of sales and property taxes. About a third (33.7%) of the respondents are strongly opposed to the use of either tax.

^{*} The figure shows the analysis results using the unweighted data. The analysis using the weighted data shows that 31.9% of all the respondents think the proposed improvements should be financed by a combination of sales and property taxes. The difference between 31.9% and 27.2% is a little more than the margin of error of this study (+/- 4.55%).




Figure 3: Finance of the Proposed Improvement: Respondents Who Had Heard About the Improvements Before vs. Respondents Who Had Not Heard About the Improvements

Before the survey, a news article publicized the improvement plan in detail. The article presented the projects taken on by the medical center before, and also indicated that currently Ellsworth County will not need a tax levy to repay this previous hospital debt. People who have heard before the survey about the proposed improvements (especially from the news article) might be more supportive of using taxes to finance the improvements than those who have not heard about it. Therefore the survey has a question asking if the respondent has heard about the proposed improvements. Valid answers were provided by 462 respondents, among whom 177 said "Yes" and 285 said "No." Figure 3 compares the answers of those 177 respondents who had hear about the improvements to the fifth guestion with the answers of those 285 respondents who had not. People who had heard about the improvements before the survey have a more distinct stance on use of taxes. More than ninetyfive percent (95.5%) of the respondents who had heard about the improvements indicate that they either support or oppose use of taxes to partially finance the medical center improvement. Among those who had not heard about the improvements before, 90.8% have a distinct stance. People who had heard about the improvements before the survey tend to be more supportive of the use of taxes than those who had not heard about the improvements before. Almost a third (32.2%) of the respondents who had heard about the improvements think the improvements should be financed by only sales tax; four percent of them think the improvements should be financed by property tax only. Among those who had not heard about the improvements, 27.1% think only sales tax should be used, and 1.8% think only property tax should be used. The two groups have almost the same percent of people who think the improvement should be financed by a combination of sales and property taxes. Overall, 63.3% of the respondents who had heard about the improvements think the improvements can be financed by either sales tax or property tax or a combination of both taxes. Among those who had not heard about the improvements before, 56.4% support use of sales tax or property tax or a combination of both.




Figure 4: Finance of the Proposed Improvement: Registered Voters vs. Non-registered Voters

Whether people are registered voters may affect their opinion on using taxes to finance the proposed improvements too. The survey has a question asking whether the respondent is registered to vote. Among 462 respondents who provided valid answers, 91.3% said "Yes"; "8.7%" said "No" (see Appendix 1). Figure 4 compares the answers of registered voters to the fifth question with the answers of non-registered voters. Register voters' answers are not significantly different from those of non-register voters. A third (33.3%) of registered voters are strongly opposed to use of either sales tax or property tax. A slightly higher percent (35%) of non-registered voters are strongly opposed to use of either tax. About sixty percent (59.2%) of registered voters think the improvements can be financed by either sales tax or property tax or a combination of both taxes. Sixty percent of non-registered voters think the same.

The survey also asks respondents to provide suggestions that would help the ECMC improve its services. Appendices 4, 5, and 6 present respondents' answers. Among 80 respondents who provided suggestions, more than 20 percent (22.5%) of them think the hospital needs more doctors. The surveyors also recorded any comments from respondents during the survey. The comments are listed in Appendices 7 and 8. High taxes and costs of improvements appear to be the top concerns of respondents.
