Executive Summary

- The preferred option for upgrading the K-6 and 7-12 hallways and classrooms is to remodel, with renovation being the second most popular option. Reconfiguring is the least popular option.
- When rated on a scale between -5 and +5, options to upgrade K-6 and 7-12 hallways and classrooms showed mean ratings (yellow form only) for remodeling to be + .92 and +.97, respectively. The mean ratings for renovation were +.25 for K-6 and +.44 for 7-12. Mean ratings to reconfigure hallways and classrooms were -.72 for K-6 and -.76 for 7-12.
- Based on respondents' ratings, the most popular projects were 1) repairing the roof; 2) repairing the current sidewalks and parking lots; 3) upgrading the restrooms; and 4) renovating the running track. Mean ratings for these projects were positive for both mailings, but especially popular for the second mailing.
- Based on respondents' ratings, the least popular projects were 11) renovate football field; 10) expand running track from 6 to 8 lanes; and 9) add classrooms for K-12 to move 3rd grade classrooms. These projects received negative mean ratings on both mailings.
- Respondents ranked projects similarly to how they rated them. Renovation of K-6 and 7-12 hallways and classrooms was ranked highly.
- Generally, the first wave of the survey, which did not contain a description of the
 projects, gleaned significantly lower ratings for the building upgrades and
 individual projects. This suggests that the public, in general, may not be familiar
 with the current needs of USD 306, and that the project descriptions included
 with the second mailing of the survey had the intended effect of providing much
 of the public with the information they needed to support a school bond.
- The survey shows that just under one-third (31%) of respondents indicated they would not vote for a bond of any size, leaving about two-thirds (69%) indicating that they would support a bond of about \$4 million, assuming they believed the projects included were important.
- A majority of respondents did not indicate support for a \$7.8 million bond, with only 47% of respondents (second mailing) indicating they would vote for a bond of this size or larger, again assuming they believed the projects included were important.

- Only 26% of respondents indicated that they would support a bond as large as \$11.7 million, even if they felt the projects included were all important.
- Results showed that just over half (53%) of respondents approve of the District allowing the current number of out-of-District students to attend USD 306 schools, while about one-third (31%) would prefer only those residing within the District attend. Relatively few (16%) wanted to increase the number of out-of-District students attending.
- Crosstabulation analysis shows that respondents who reported voting in the last school bond election tended to favor smaller bonds or no bond at all, while those who said they did not vote in the last bond election were more likely to support a large bond. These results suggest that a voter turnout drive might glean a higher proportion of votes in favor of a bond.
- Respondents who said they voted in the last bond election were more likely to prefer that no additional construction be done to accommodate out-of-District students.
- There was a strong correlation between the preferred policy for handling out-of-District students and the largest size of school bond respondents said they would support. Those who prefer that only residents of USD 306 attend the schools were much more likely to oppose any size of bond, while those who preferred to construct additional space were much more likely to support a \$15 million bond.
- Narrative responses expressed concern over increasing taxes and spending, housing of out-of-District students and trust in the school board. Many comments expressed strong support for education-based improvements.

Methodology

In January of 2017, the Docking Institute of Public Affairs at Fort Hays State University contracted with Unified School District 306 to conduct a study to measure District voter support for a variety of prospective improvement projects identified as high-need by District administrators, as well as some opinions on school bond-related issues. The manifest purpose of the study is to provide valid data to assist administrators in authoring a bond proposal that will best meet the educational needs of students in the District and have a high probability of passing in a bond election. It also serves the latent function of improving rapport between the voters and the USD 306 school board. The opinions and preferences for the various proposed improvement projects among registered voters residing within the District were measured using a self-administered survey delivered to respondents' mailing addresses of record via U.S. Postal Service.

The survey instrument (Appendix A) was constructed in cooperation with District administrators and designed to measure respondents' preference for an overall improvement strategy, level of support for each individual improvement project, the size of school bond they would be willing to support and their policy preferences for handling out-of-District students. A survey question also measured whether the respondent reported voting in the most recent USD 306 bond election.

The sample data were purchased from the relevant county clerks, which included the most current official list of registered voters in the District with their home mailing addresses. The Institute had the Post Office update the file to include recent moves, leaving a sample of 2,265 registered voters. Surveys were mailed on February 23, 2017, but because the project description sheet was mistakenly omitted from the first mailing, all respondents received a second complete mailing on March 7. Data collection was terminated on April 28, at which time 247 from the first wave and 545 from the second wave of completed surveys had been returned for a total of 792 returned questionnaires. Assuming many respondents completed both questionnaires, the minimal response rate for the 545 subjects returning the second questionnaire is 21.1%, which is typical for our school bond surveys and represents what would be about half of voters in the most recent USD 306 bond election. Because there was no random sampling and all members of the target population were sent the survey, there is no margin of error. However, because not all 2,265 responded, there is a potential for response bias. The survey data were entered into an SPSS data file for analysis.

Responses to Survey Questions




Figure 1: Level of Support for Remodeling, Renovating or Reconfiguring K-6

Figure 1 shows the distributions of responses when respondents were asked to indicate their support for either remodeling, renovating or reconfiguring the K-6 hallways and classrooms. Although responses from the original mailing tended to be more opposed to each alternative, results from both mailings show the **highest levels of support for remodeling the K-6 hallways and classrooms**, with reconfiguring receiving the least level of support.





Figure 2: Level of Support for Remodeling, Renovating or Reconfiguring 7-12

Figure 2 shows the distributions of responses when respondents were asked to indicate their support for either remodeling, renovating or reconfiguring the 7-12 hallways and classrooms. Although responses from the original mailing tended to be more opposed to each alternative, results from both mailings show the **highest levels of support for remodeling the K-6 hallways and classrooms**, with reconfiguring receiving the least level of support.






Figure 3 shows more clearly the priorities reported in the original mailing, the second mailing and both mailings combined. For each category of survey, and for both the K-6 and 7-12 halls and classrooms, the highest mean ratings were for remodeling, followed by renovation, with reconfiguration being the lowest rated. Note that reconfiguring any of the halls and classrooms received an overall negative mean rating for both mailings, while renovation received positive mean ratings in only the second mailing. The results indicate a strong preference for remodeling over renovation and reconfiguration for both the K-6 and 7-12 hallways and classrooms.




Figure 4: Mean Ratings for 13 Proposed Upgrade Projects

Figure 4 shows the mean ratings for each of the proposed improvement projects for both mailings, ranked from highest to lowest according to the second mailing results, which closely matched the rankings of the combined mailings. **Replacement of the roof** received, by far, the highest ratings in both mailings. Both mailings were also congruent on the next three most-supported upgrades; repair of the current sidewalks and parking lot, upgrading the restrooms, and renovating the running track.

Remodeling 7-12 and K-6 hallways and classrooms ranked fifth and sixth in the second mailing. Although the first mailing rated moving the administrative office and upgrade elementary playground as fifth and sixth, renovating K-6 and 7-12 were ranked seventh and eighth.

Both mailings were congruent in rating the three least-supported projects; renovating the football field, adding classrooms to K-6 in order to move 3rd grade classrooms and expanding the track from 6 to 8 lanes.




Figure 5: Ranking of 13 Proposed Upgrades and Improvements

Figure 5 shows how each proposed upgrade and improvement project was rank ordered by respondents. Numbers in brackets are the mean rankings, with smaller numbers indicating higher priority. This analysis supports previous conclusions from the rating analysis that **the roof, parking lots and sidewalks are the highest priority items for voters**. It also supports previous conclusions **that expanding the running track**, **upgrading the playground and renovating the football field are low priority items for voters**.

This analysis also shows how renovation of K-6 and 7-12 classrooms and hallways are prioritized by the voters. Renovation of K-6 yielded a higher mean ranking than renovation of 7-12, but renovation of both areas fell within the half of items deemed most urgent.




Figure 6: Maximum Bond Amount Respondent Would Vote For

Figure 6 shows the distribution of responses when asked, assuming the bond contained projects respondents believed would be important, what the largest school bond they would vote for. Responses to the original mailing (white form) were notably lower than for the second mailing (yellow form). The white form can be interpreted as responses from those more opposed to the bond and the yellow form from those more supportive, leaving the combined measure as a valid conservative estimate of voting behaviors.

About one-third of respondents indicated they would vote against any school bond presented to the voters. The remaining two-thirds indicated they could vote for at least a \$3.9 million bond, while less than half (44%) indicated that they could vote for a \$7.8 million bond. Almost one-fourth (23%) said they were open to an \$11.7 million bond, while only 10% would consider a \$15 million bond. These results suggest that passing a \$4 million bond should be easy, if it contained popular projects. Passing an \$8 million bond would be more difficult and would require inclusion of only the most popular improvement projects, as well as an effective campaign to inform the voters. The results suggest passing a bond larger than \$8 million would be difficult and require changing the minds of a significant number of voters.




Figure 7: Policy Preference for Out-of-District Students

Respondents were asked to choose their preference among three policy alternatives for handling students who reside outside the geographic boundaries of USD 306, but wish to attend District schools. The most common policy preference on both mailings was to allow a select number of these students to attend, but not so many as to require additional construction, with just over half of respondents indicating this preference. About one-third of respondents preferred allowing only students who reside within the District, excluding all out-of-District students. Only one-seventh of respondents favored building additional space to accommodate out-of-District students.

Respondents to the original mailing were slightly more likely to prefer excluding out-of-District students, while respondents to the second mailing, though only a small percentage, were more likely to prefer building additional elementary school space to accommodate out-of-District students.





Figure 8: Maximum Bond Amount Respondent Would Vote For by Whether Voted in Last Bond Election

Figure 8 shows the difference in responses between those who self-reported voting in the most recent school bond election and those who did not. **Generally, those who reported voting were more likely to support only a small school bond or no bond at all, while those who said they did not vote in the last bond election were more likely to support a large bond.** These results suggest that strategies to increase voter turnout would likely increase the chances of a large school bond passing.






Figure 9 shows that self-reported voters in the last school bond election differed somewhat from non-voters in their preferences for handling out-of-District students. Although voters were slightly more likely to oppose out-of-District students, the primary difference between voters and non-voters is that voters were much less likely to favor building additional elementary school space to accommodate outof-District students. These results suggest that an effort to increase voter turnout would help pass a bond that included additional construction to the elementary school, but not enough to overcome opposition to such construction by those who vote already.




Figure 10: Maximum Bond Respondent Would Vote For by Preference for Out-Of-District Students

Figure 10 illustrates an interesting correlation between respondents' policy preferences for handling out-of-District students and the maximum bond they would support. Respondents indicating a preference to exclude all out-of-District students from USD 306 schools are almost 3 times as likely as those that would allow out-of-District students and almost 30 times more likely than those who favor building additional elementary school space for additional students to say they would not vote for any school bond, not matter the size. Similarly, respondents who would support additional construction to allow a select number of out-of-District students attend are more than 30 times more likely than those who would allow no outside students, and more than 10 times as likely as those who would allow outside students, but not support additional construction, to support a school bond of up to \$15 million. These results strongly suggest that the out-of-District issue is a major obstacle to obtaining majority support for a school bond, even a relatively small one. It also suggests that reconciling the issue, by either prohibiting out-of-District students or convincing skeptics that these students are a good thing for the District, support for a larger school bond could be obtained.

Narrative Responses

The raw data responses to the two survey questions soliciting narrative responses can be viewed in Appendix B. Institute researchers conducted content analysis of the narrative data to categorize the various comments and quantify the most commonly cited issues.





Figure 11: Categorized Narrative Responses to First Narrative Question

When asked if there was something specific that would lead the respondent to vote for or against a school bond, dominant concerns tended to be the status of out-of-District students, aversion to higher taxes and spending and a lack of faith in or distrust of the school board. Although 3 respondents reiterated that they would not vote for any bond, twice as many (6) respondents reiterated that they would vote for any reasonable bond proposal.





When asked if the respondent had any additional comments, responses were somewhat similar to the previous narrative responses. Dominant themes included strong support for educational improvements, distrust of or lack of faith in the school board and those reiterating that they would not support any bond or that money for improvements should be raised other ways. Those who opposed out-of-District students were almost as likely to reiterate this desire in the followup narrative question as those who favored allowing them.

Conclusions

The study results suggest that, within the current environment, it is feasible for USD 306 to pass a modest school bond, somewhere between \$4,000,000 and \$7,000,000. The degree to which a bond of higher amount would likely pass depends on the popularity of the projects included. For a \$7,000,000 bond to be feasible, it would probably need to

exclude five or six of the lowest rated projects as indicated in Figure 4. With a \$4,000,000 bond, one or two of the more unpopular projects might be feasible.

The data also suggest that efforts could be made to increase support for a larger bond, if the included projects were all rated highly. The power of the out-of-Districts student issue to influence voting behaviors cannot be overstated. Respondents were highly divided on this issue, which suggests wide disparity among District residents in how they perceive these students affecting the quality of their own kids' education or the amount of money these students are costing them in additional taxes.

If there is little evidence that this is true, it suggests wide disparity in understanding of how out-of-District students actually affect the quality of education and costs to District residents. If a convincing argument can be made that out-of-District students do not detract from the quality of education or increase costs to residents, an effective educational campaign to inform voters of the positive impact of these students could significantly enhance support for a school bond or increase the amount of the bond that would be supported by a majority of voters.

Additional support for an educational campaign is found in the numerous comments regarding trust and faith in the school board. Conducting this bond survey has projected the message that the USD 306 Board is interested in gaining input from the community and fashioning a bond based on voter preferences. Docking researchers believe that releasing the results of the bond survey to the public will project an even stronger message of transparency and desire to gain the public's trust. Constructing and floating a bond of size and content congruent with the survey results should go a long way in enhancing trust and faith in the school board, winning over the skeptics and the undecided, and maximizing election turnout among those supporting the bond. The data indicate that those who did not vote in the last bond election tended to be more supportive of a school bond, so a "get out the vote" drive should tend to increase the proportion of voters who would support a given bond. A successful campaign of this type could perhaps facilitate the feasibility of a bond larger than \$7,000,000.

Please read the list of definitions, clarifications, and brief explanations below before completing the survey and refer to them while completing the questionnaire.

Remodel: Surface changes which could include floor coverings, paint, stain, etc.

Renovate: Could include additional storage space, new furniture, fixtures, ceilings, lighting, etc. Replace movable wall panels with solid walls but NOT relocate walls.

Reconfigure: Relocate existing walls, replace where necessary, "re-shaping and/or resizing" current spaces.

Elementary classrooms in sub-level: Third grade classrooms and one section of 6th grade are currently located in the sub-level of our school. One of these rooms was built to be the weight room. The current weight room was originally built to be the wrestling practice room. The weight room and wrestling room now share the same space. This is not a safe situation but has been made necessary due to spaces being repurposed.

STEM: Refers to the classes which teach: <u>Science</u>, <u>Technology</u>, <u>Engineering and/or</u> <u>Math</u>. Current Technical Education spaces are small and not suited for today's equipment and projects. Secondary science classrooms are small and not equipped for modern instruction and learning activities.

P.E.: Refers to <u>Physical Education</u>. Currently, the weight room and wrestling room share space. This is not a safe situation but has been made necessary due to space being repurposed for use as K-6 classrooms. The weight room is used every day before, during, and after school and daily throughout the summer.

Locker Rooms: Locker rooms are an area that are used before, during, and after school. Many of the lockers are original to the building and are dented and bent. Some cannot be secured. Some plumbing and fixtures in the shower rooms are in need of replacement and/or upgrades.

Exterior Hard Surfaces: Parking Lot and Sidewalks:

The existing parking lot has "alligator cracks." These are longitudinal cracks that grow into a network of interconnected cracks. This cracking resembles the skin of an alligator, hence the name. This is a condition that occurs in asphalt pavements with weak or un-stabilized bases and/or poor drainage. Over time water has penetrated under the surface through the cracks and into the base and subgrade, weakening the support. This has lead to the development of potholes.

In regards to the sidewalks, there are sections that have settled over time, leading to uneven walking surfaces. Also, snow and ice removal over the years has led to some deteriorating surfaces as some areas are chipped and pocked. This is especially true in shaded areas.

Track Renovation:

SES is unable to host any competitions because the current track is in such poor condition.

Renovating the current track and leaving it as a 6-lane track would be disqualify SES from hosting any Kansas State High School Activities Association post-season events. The KSHSAA requires 7 lane tracks be used, but 8 lanes are preferred.

To expand from a 6 lane to an 8 lane track would require the visitor side bleachers to be moved.

Football Field Renovation: Put in an underground irrigation system, re-crown the field for better drainage, and install new <u>natural</u> grass sod.

Roof: SES has 150,000 square feet of roof. Much of the roof is approaching the end of its life and is showing signs of deterioration. It will soon need either extensive repairs or replacement. At current costs it is estimated that the cost of replacement would be at least \$1 million.

Playground Renovation: Improve drainage, upgrade equipment, improve safety, and replace ground cover.

Move administrative offices to the front of the Building: This would involve an "office swap." The current counseling offices would become the administrative offices and the administrative offices would be relocated to the area now occupied by the counseling offices. The office of the school nurse could stay in the current location at the center of the building. Some additional space would have to be added to the current counseling offices to be utilized as administrative offices.

Out-of-District Enrollment: Currently 30% of our student population does not reside within USD 306. The children of USD 306 employees who reside outside the boundaries of USD 306 account for 6% of our total student population. The out-of-district children whose parents are not employed by USD 306 must make an application yearly which is subject to administrative review and Board approval. Current K-6 enrollment is at or exceeds the optimal capacity of the current classrooms.

- I volunteer at the school so have some ideas of the issues and still struggled to complete this survey adequately. More education of the issues needs to be done. For instance the playground has little to no ground. Definitely not safe.
- Why haven't things been taken care of as they are needed instead of waiting until it became more critical and more expensive to repair?
- Auditorium needs more seating or less kids on program night. Something needs to be

done.

Why not use the large wasted space in the north main entrance for administrative offices.

We need to take care of the education of our children. The community takes the S k-5 school for granted.

I appreciate the board working to repair the building without using a bond.

It seems like we just got a new playground. How many years has it been? I would have marked STEM higher except that technology is out dated so quickly.

I trust the board and staff of 306 to prioritize the proposed projects.

I want to remain a big 3A school, not have to move to a small 4A school.

The roof is probably a priority.

We seem to redo jobs and pay second time as well. Doors, roof drains etc. SES in time past took care of our school and grounds. Now we just want new and ask for more tax money. Let's put someone or more in charge of new projects so they get done right or not do them at all. Please don't waste money like government projects. If we need more space, let's see what we need- then reduce class sizes to meet that need. Please spend cap outlay money on projects in need, like some you are to do this summer. Not computers and devices. We also had people coming to board meetings and we could communicate with them without being on some agenda. We are not that big. Not good or personal. How about a change?

- Why is the roof involved in the budget? There needs to be a meeting to answer questions before voting.
- Still LOTS of pain from last bond issue! Long term friendships broken. Some of it was caused mainly by Dwight Conley and Justin Knopf. Makes me feel like voting against whatever they are for.

Academics not athletics

- SES was built for in district students. Elementary should stay 2 classrooms per grade. Lockers and plumbing should have already been taken care of.
- Parking Lot, Locker rooms, track, playground, junky classrooms, all in disrepair. All should be maintained well with capital overlay. All the money has gone on too many "devices" and extra staff and still maintenance seems not to be done. Please get back to common sense spending- It is out of balance. Computers can certainly wait until upper elementary. We are ruining kids.

Please, no more tax increases.

- I will not, nor will I support a bond until we have a plan to live within the means of the district. It appears items are in a state of destruction due to neglect. Philips lighting will be gone within the next 5 years. Who do you think will pay for this?
- The strongest support should be focused on improving the areas that support the teachers and academics
- We did not vote last time because we were out of the District, but we helped with promoting the bond. Want to stay 3A.

I like to see us use out-of-District students fill our schools to the max # of students allowed to keep us a large 3A, but not push us over to a small 4A.

- \$9.9 million is max to pass bond.
- Why is the school not being taken care of? They let the water run on the track and ruin it. They leave equipment out all year long. I walk the track a lot and see a lot of waste going on people not doing their job. I've seen people washing their own trucks, seen people get ice and put their trash in the dumpsters on a Sunday. This to me is stealing.

We cannot allow the facility to continue to deteriorate. Doing nothing is not an option, as

that will result in the eventual closing of the school.

No additional taxes.

Try to stop taxing and spending.

- I am not opposed to out-of-District students, but I believe there should be a cap on limit allowed in.
- I feel you should limit the out-of-District and utilize the space you have.
- Is it possible to have an out-of-District fee?
- I am a farmer (landowner) and we need to downsize to fill our current facility. Farm income is way down and we don't need to be paying for a bond issue for out-of-District students.
- The option to move the Admin office to the front of the building is a good idea. This move would allow for locking the doors. Better safety for students and faculty.
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- I've had two kids attend and graduate.
- Opinion on replace "roof" option pending assessment of existing condition. Higher priority if end of life span.
- SES has been a valued school, but now has fallen into disrepair. Where is responsibility? Maintain, not build new. Be proud of what you have, not what you don't have.
- Somebody needs to be in charge of upkeep. Why is it all in such a bad shape? Are you neglecting to wait for new?
- Since the Salina schools have upgraded, those out-of-District students should be attending school within their district.
- All this goes back to encouraging, needing people to live in district to come and responsible people to make sure the facilities are manage and taken care of.
- I just think these are better places to put money than most of your ideas. I would like to see public education get back to basics. Like the Rs. Teaching students
- to use electronic devices to do everything makes for a lazier brain. Self-reliance, resilience and innovation are lost.

As the bond suggests, I will be voting against this next election.

- You cannot rely on state funding to help cover cost. If out of district students are allowed there should be additional cost assessed to them since tax dollars are not going to our school district.
- It's not necessary to add onto the bldg. again if out of districts students are not included out of district families will not be paying these mills or taxes!!

Out of district families don't pay for these projects keep them out!!

- I feel our district needs to provide early childhood programs for young children. we have parents as teachers but no other early intervention. I believe a preschool &/or daycare program is are lacking both types of programs
- I would be in favor of a larger auditorium for both elem. and high school for band & vocal. The gym doesn't have a good sound. The elem attendance is high and not enough room most of the time.

Are we looking to turf the football field? I would vote for that improvement.

They won't take any better care of any renovations! The new would soon be in dirty broken down condition in no time! Prove you can take care of what you have & then ask for the bond issue.

I would hope we would remain 3A not 4A.

- Courts out of school issues.
- Maintaining the school is important and must be done but money needs to be spent carefully

- Needs to have hrs. For patrons to see school have not been there in yrs. Admin office should never have been moved.
- We don't need millions of \$ for this proposal. 1. Required area space per pupil in classroom? 2. What's the outlook for future growth? 3 How can a structure be built on a hill have such a drainage problem? 4 What's reserve amount per pupil?
 5. Leave admin office as is. 6. Roof should be #1 7 out of district students should pay our per pupil cost to maintain our school.
- I think fund-raisers would help and involve those who are out of District. After prom at SES use to raise \$10,000 a year for one night of fun. South and Central raised and found donor for their turf.
- It appears more attention should be given to ongoing maintenance and if you know the lifespan of a roof or parking lot, a fund should be established to deal with that and not have a bond issue to provide normal upkeep. Any work on the track should be adequate to host meets, which can provide some revenue.

No to track and football.

In June 2014, I was not a USD 306 resident-so I was not eligible to vote on the bond. Your survey is misleading when combining STEM with PE.

- Restrooms-A little bit of paint goes a long way. There are cheaper ways to repair and upgrade. Really, even 3.9 mill is way too much.
- I would like to have a covered shelter for our buses. We spend a lot of money on buses and they are the most important part of getting rural kids to school.
- Strengthen the out-of-District policy to specific details of caps on classroom sizes, acceptance/declination policy, give strong weight on the capabilities of our teachers and needs of the in-District students before allowing classes to max out in size just because we have the space. I would love to see the Board improve this overall acceptance policy before I vote yes to a large bond.

Upgrades on track-football should be private sponsor (for naming rights).

- We like core sports but lean more toward academic education. Private sponsors need to give for upgrades and fields (or fund at least half).
- What is the real value for accommodating out-of-District students into the District if it costs the District money?

Fill the cracks in the parking lot vs. replacing it.

- We are not like Salina where they have a large number of people to spread the tax burden over. We have a very small % of people that have to pay a big tax burden. Cut out-of-District since it costs us money. Roof is a priority. Parking lot can be patched.
- Set a budget and repair something big each year. If it is not in the budget, then how are you going to keep renovations looking good? If there isn't enough help, then hire more- and be sure they aren't afraid to work. I was out at the school lately and couldn't believe the paint off the walls by elementary kitchen and how filthy the bathrooms were. Really! You want new!
- Should turf be considered? Would it be more economical considering how much the school spends per year on water?
- I don't know the condition of the football field and track and roof, so it's hard to vote on it. If out-of-town students want to come in, is there a way to have them pay what our mill tax would be?

English and tech ed are strengths. Improve math and science.

Key to education is good teachers and responsible parents. New/larger space and equipment helpful, but doesn't take the place of an excellent teacher. Maintain what we have and fix up yearly. Don't let items degrade until they have to be replaced.

We have some of the best locker rooms in the league. They are fine. The Science Lab could be utilized better. Keep funding STEM and career education facilities. Those career skills need to be developed in students so they can get excited about education.

We seem to have wants and needs. The needs should come first.

- I am not satisfied with the Board hiring people who are not qualified for the job and who live outside the District. Hiring of the relations of the current staff who are not qualified for the position.
- This is a rural school with ag/land tax basis. More information should be given on the increase to land taxes.
- Child safety on playground should be at the top of our list.
- I have been a teacher for 12 years. I understand the importance of a bond passing-don't waste people's time.
- Spent 7 years on committees working on original bond. Never saw new Board members until bond opposition.
- I do not think the school needs to expand to bring in more out-of-District students. We can be a good school without growing bigger.
- Please stop increasing enrollment fees.
- Would appreciate information about bond issue more than 2 weeks before bond election. Do not have internet, so need mailing.

More consistent and reliable help.

If people want to go to our schools, they should move into the District.

- With the economy right now, it's a bad time for a vote again.
- It is important for the current Board to realize now necessary it is to keep up and improve our school.
- There is no information concerning how much the football field/track improvements would be-I am assuming millions. I cannot justify spending \$ that would benefit a handful of students. If class size is too large to keep the elementary students on the main floor, maybe it is time to limit or not allow out of District students.
- Get 3rd grade out of the basement and turn on the lights! We need a functional facility, not a "state of the art" facility.
- It is time for a bond! For \$10 to \$15 per month, we can repair many things and have a school we are proud of.
- Out of District students should pay some tuition. My taxes go up very much each year. I can't afford any more.
- I will vote for any bond that helps our in-District students' academic success.
- The lack of maintenance on this facility is most disappointing. Someone needs to do a better job handling maintenance in the future.
- It appears you need to maintain the facility you have with more diligence, just as we do our home. Don't let things go to pot.
- STEM and PE do not belong together. As a 2012 graduate of SES, I was NOT college prepared. There were large gaps in knowledge that I missed, especially in the sciences.
- Maintenance has been lacking for several years. When you got something fix it. Track has been left in disrepair. Parking needs repair, but not total reconstruction. If there is a bond, I want a bond within reason.
- When the 2014 bond was voted down, agriculture was in much better financial shape than it currently is. A large portion of SES district is from ground or homes that are largely affected by ag prices. No one in the ag sector is looking for more expenses at the moment, and our Board should consider that factor when coming up with a new bond.

I only support improvements for the children here in the community to succeed in their education.

Turf on football field.

- I don't like that I have paid text book fees and because of the abundance of out-of-District kids, there are not enough books to go around. The same is true for desks. Out of District kids should pay increased fees. Parents of out of District should transport their kids to school, not ride the buses. 3 out of District parents should not serve on the Board.
- It's my understanding that the roof is still under warranty so take care of it before the warranty runs out no need to include it on the bond.

I'm still greatly disappointed that the last bond issue was defeated.

- I hope the school board has reconsidered a thing or two after the last bond failed so miserably. By the time the public meetings were being held for the last bond, it became obvious that the board had already decided exactly what to do and didn't listen or change anything based on all the concerns from patrons at the meetings. I hope this survey represents a new approach. Please also have meetings in the public and listen to them this time.
- Both my spouse and I and our children graduated from SES and I have been a lifelong supporter of our school. However, the last bond seemed to ignore so many concerns in our community I've lost trust. I also seem to know so few of the kids and staff anymore. I will always support SES but stop over-filling our school with Salina kids.

Several landowners are seniors who cannot afford this at this ag economic time.

- Think about: Summer school, summer recreation programs, eliminate bus service at least have fewer stops. Consolidate to 4 stops!
- Not happy with 3rd grade teachers/classrooms. TOO much screen time! Every time I visit, classrooms seem to be chaos!! I see A LOT of teacher bias/"favorites" with athletes! Even at the elementary level. I think that needs to be addressed with ALL staff.
- I am an SES grad and strong supporter of our school. I would like to support a bond but the last one was such a disaster and out of touch with our community. There's no way I could support it. I hope this one is a better reflection of the values of our community. Also, many of our teachers and staff used to live in our community and be our neighbors. I now know hardly any staff who live in our community. It would be nice if more of them lived in our district, or even better, here in Assaria. LASTLY, STOP OVER-FILLING OUR ELEMENTARY WITH NON-DISTRICT STUDENTS.
- I think 1 to 1 iPads are not necessary and possibly harmful to our K-3 students. PLEASE stop wasting so much taxpayer money on these devices and repair the school. From a concerned mom these kids need fine motor development and need to learn with real objects not iPads. Also, I think when we accept so many students that we need 3 sessions per grade, and thus a larger school, taxpayer money is wasted. There is also a chance of losing control of the quality of out of district students that we accept (in order to fil space). As the out of district population increases, the disconnect between school and community increases.

Charge out of district fee at enrolment.

I would support an increase in enrolment fees rather than a bond increase. This would capture Salina students instead of placing the tax burden on just residents. Can Salina/out of district students pay an additional "fee" for living out of district?! What about a "transportation fee" for riding the buses?! Can we collect a "fee" from them for taking up space on our buses?! Can out of district families pay an

additional "fee" of some sort?! I am happy with our "GRUMPY" Superintendent! The rodent problem needs to be addressed! My kids talk about their teachers catching mice in their classrooms ALL THE TIME! And I'm sure the Teachers have to pay for the traps!

Why haven't remodels and renovations been done a little bit every year?? Where's the budget and who's spending money on foolish things? I have to budget for projects...a little every year. Why can't the school? Why/who decided to exceed the optional capacity of current K-6 classrooms?

The roof leaks in 3rd grade directly above my child's seat even when it's not raining. We are so behind in maintaining a facility to be proud of. The time is now! Phasing protect ongoing into the future is a must. If not, we will be back in the same situation 20-30 down the road.
