

National Campus Leaders Summit

Organizational Leadership major Megan Rust was nominated to represent Leadership Studies at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum National Campus Leaders Summit in Washington, DC. She was one of five FHSU students to travel to the Museum with FHSU being one of ten schools in the nation accepted into the program. The students invited Holocaust survivor, Gene Klein, to Fort Hays to speak, encourage discussion, and show students the importance of bystander intervention. Megan said it was special knowing she would be bringing a speaker to campus that would have an impact on people. Hearing Klein's perspective made the Holocaust research she has done more

On April 13-15, 2018, the department will host the Collegiate Leadership Competition (CLC). The competition will increase participants' understanding of personal strengths and areas for improvement by stretching them to the boundaries of their knowledge, skills, and abilities. Every year, teams form in the fall semester and each participant goes through rigorous training with their coach to prepare. Dr. Brett Whitaker will serve as the FHSU coach. To help meet the national need for formal Title IX educational training, Dr. Christie Brungardt worked with the FHSU Higher Education Student Affairs (HESA) program to develop a nine-credit hour Masters Certificate. This certificate is for anyone interested in enhancing and credentialing themselves for Title IX work Dr. Brungardt developed the introductory course, which is the virtual course, LDRS 600: Leadership of Title IX in *Higher Education*. The primary purpose of this course is to study the intersection between the theory and practice of leadership as applied to effective implementation of federal Title IX legislation and enforcement. This course is condensed into an 8-week session, which is then followed with AEP 874: Title IX Investigations and Working with the Survivors and Accused, as well as HESA 815: Higher Education Law. Eighteen students have completed the introductory course, and many of those students are now working to complete the full certificate.








