Part Writing

When part writing, keep in mind three basic guidelines:

- 1. **Independence of voices** (each voice must sound independent)
- 2. **Parsimonious voice leading** (smallest distance between two chords)
- 3. **Proper treatment of dissonance** (must be prepared by step or common tone and must resolve appropriately)

All part writing errors are transgressions against one or more of these guidelines.

This chart shows common errors and how many points are lost for each:

	Excessive avoidable leaping in upper parts
	Harmonic prolongation from weak beat to strong beat
	Root-position diminished triad
	Wrong inversion
	More than an octave between soprano & alto or alto & tenor

When taking a time-limited exam such as the proficiency exam, you should focus first on avoiding 3- and 2-point errors.
