High Incidence

Already licensed teacher:

- Can work as a special education teacher in Kansas on a Waiver then with a provisional license upon completion of three specific classes
- Available 100% online
- Graduate program: 27 credit hours for licensure, 36 hours to earn Master's degree

Non-licensed teacher (LAL Program):

- Must have one year of work experience as a paraprofessional
- Must be employed as a special education teacher in Kansas
- Will work under Limited Apprentice License (LAL) while completing the program
- 3 year program
- Available 100% online
- Graduate program: 36 hours to earn Master's degree

Minor through Teacher Education Dept:

- Available to candidates to complete concurrently with our traditional programs
- 18 credit hours
- 100% online
- Eligible for full endorsement in special education upon completion

Gifted

- Must be licensed teacher
- Can work as a Gifted special education teacher in Kansas on a Waiver, then with a provisional license (must complete three specific classes)
- Available 100% online
- Graduate program: 15 credit hours for licensure, 21 hours to earn Master's degree

Let's get started...

What else should I know about becoming a teacher?

To get a first teaching license in Kansas, you must pass two licensure tests, at a minimum: 1) a Subject Area Assessment for the licensure area, 2) Principles of Learning and Teaching (PLT), a pedagogy test. Also must pass a performance assessment, completed during the final practicum or student teaching.

How do I get started in one of the Graduate programs?

4. Work with your assigned advisor regarding your Plan of Study

Can I complete these programs online or while living out of state?

Transition to Teaching and High Incidence SPED (LAL) programs require employment in Kansas. Most of the traditional secondary content areas require some on campus classes. Elementary Education (both grad and undergrad), Early Childhood Unified, Business education, Gifted, and High Incidence SPED for already licensed teachers are available 100% online and do not require Kansas residency.

Secondary Education (grades 6-12 or PreK-12)

Traditional Program www.fhsu.edu/cert/

- Agriculture, Art, Biology, Business, Chemistry, Earth & Space Science, English, German, History, Math, Music, Physical Education, Physics, Spanish, Technology
- Business education, PE, and Spanish are available 100% online
- Program length varies from 30-75 credit hours, depending on major
- 17 credit hours of education classes plus one semester of student teaching...100% online
- Bachelor's degree required for licensure
- Cannot serve as teacher until program is completed

Transition to Teaching (T2T)

- Program available for most subject areas
- Must hold a bachelor's degree in a specific subject area or coursework equivalent to a major in a subject area
- Must pass relevant Praxis test
- Must be hired as teacher of record in Kansas in the qualified subject area
- Must have 2.75 GPA on most recent 60 cr hrs
- 2 year program, Coursework 100% online
- Graduate program: 24 cr hrs for licensure, 36 hrs to earn Master's degree in education

Master of Science - Secondary Education

Same basic requirements as T2T, but do not have to be hired as a teacher and do not have to live in Kansas to complete the program.
