THE UPSIDE OF HELICOPTER PARENTING: ENGAGING PARENTS TO REDUCE FIRST-YEAR STUDENT DRINKING

University personnel tend to view "helicopter" parents as problematic. This article presents an alternative view in which these highly engaged parents can instead be utilized productively. The authors describe and assess the fidelity of a novel program in which involved parents were effectively leveraged to mitigate student alcohol-related risk. The feasibility of utilizing similar programs at other schools is discussed as are implications for alcohol risk prevention.

NARRATIVES OF INTERDEPENDENCE AND INDEPENDENCE: THE ROLE OF SOCIAL CLASS AND FAMILY RELATIONSHIPS IN WHERE HIGH-ACHIEVING STUDENTS APPLY TO COLLEGE

Research demonstrates that social class shapes where high-achieving students apply to college. Based on 45 in-depth interviews with high-achieving students in the Bay Area, I find that higher SES students are more likely to apply to out-of-state public and private universities, especially liberal arts and Ivy League colleges. I argue that the upbringing and experiences associated with students' social classes shape their narratives regarding how much autonomy or constraints they perceive in making decisions about their choices of college. In discussing their upbringing and their future, higher-SES students present a narrative of independence about what they have done to prepare themselves for college and where to apply.

"No, you need to do your own thing. Besides, you don't want to be at school with your sister."

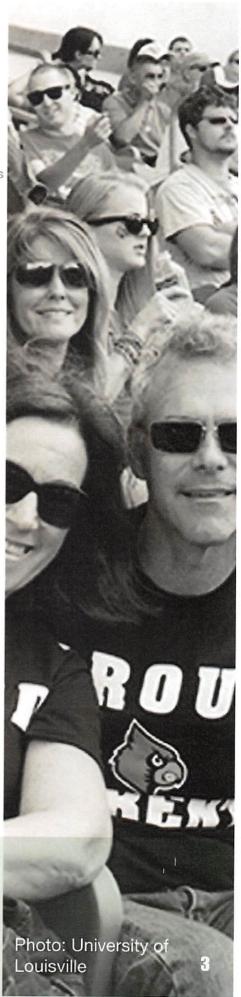
Hindsight being 20/20, I now see the importance of creating your own path.

Fort Hays State University's Office of Transition and Student Conduct is committed to partnering with parents and families in order to promote student success.

When incoming students arrive on campus in the summer for the Tiger Stripes Orientation and Pre-Enrollment program, guests and family members spend the day with the Parent and Family track. Often, family members are pleasantly surprised by the emphasis the program and staff place on introducing them, and not just their students, to the institution.

One of many highlights of the Parent and Family Orientation at Fort Hays State is the Spanish-speaking track, Familia Orientacion en Espanol. Conducted by Spanish-speaking staff and student leaders, Familia Orientacion en Espanol serves families of the rapidly growing Hispanic student population, which is currently exceeding 18% of the University's enrollment. The staff members who work on this track are incredibly proud to be able to provide much-needed information and programming to families in their primary language. Hector Villanueva, a Multicultural Admissions Counselor, serves as the lead facilitator for Familia Orientacion en Espanol, which averages more than 30 family member in attendance for each day's sessions.

Brett Bruner, Director of Transition and Student Conduct at FHSU stated, "The additions and enhancements to our Familia Orientacion en Espanol program have assisted our institution in taking our parent and family as well as orientation and transition programs to the next level. Without campus partnerships, we would not have the robust offerings to serve all of our parent and family members in their transition to FHSU."

In addition, Parent and Family Orientation student leaders who are comfortable speaking Spanish make themselves available and visible to families by wearing "¿Tienes preguntas?" buttons. These buttons are used to assist all parents and family members who attend orientation sessions, including those who do not choose to participate in Familia Orientacion en Espanol.

The Parent and Family Orientation staff believe the ability to answer questions in the languages family members are most comfortable using is an invaluable component of the program. These buttons were a simple idea derived from the Parent and Family Orientation student director and student staff to further support family members in their student's transition.

Parent and family programs are a critical component of transition initiatives at Fort Hays State University, especially for the families of incoming students. The Parent and Family Orientation team at FHSU strives to make the transition as seamless as possible for families sending students to the FHSU community.
